We are a vibrant Christian school community committed to providing an education for young people grounded on the teachings and principles taught in God's Word, the Bible. We are a small, caring Christ-centred school which provides a unique and special environment that equips a young person well for further study or to enter the workforce.

A provider of Primary and Secondary education from 1991, we also opened a brand new Early Learning Centre in 2016 catering for preschool ages.

We seek to present the academic requirements of the Australian curriculum from a historic Protestant Christian worldview perspective. Our staff are all committed Bible-believing Christians who regularly attend local evangelical Protestant churches. Their love for God motivates their teaching of the young people entrusted to their care.

Based on the conviction that all people are created in the image of God and that human nature is the same now as it was in earlier centuries, our educational philosophy is therefore oriented towards the more traditional direct instruction approach and aims to encourage the habit of excellence in all areas of life in our students. We seek to lay a solid foundation for later years by providing an intensive phonics reading program (Spalding) from Kindergarten. In numeracy, we have introduced Scholastic's Prime Mathematics programme (based on the highly successful Singapore curriculum).

Our intensive phonics program for reading and writing (Spalding), gives a solid foundation for all students, especially those who may struggle with learning difficulties. We believe that an emphasis on literacy and numeracy in the formative years gives children the best possible grounding for future opportunities.

Yes, we are a smaller school

Designed as a smaller school community, we are better able to offer a protective and nurturing environment. Our close-knit community enables staff to know all students by name and be concerned with their individual welfare. We also notice when they are struggling and need extra help and support. Your child will not get lost in the system.

A Holistic Approach

Covenant seeks to partner with parents to develop the whole character of a child – this holistic approach looks at their mental, physical and spiritual welfare, as

well as their academic achievement.

We strive to maintain a "culture of grace" for our students, which shepherds and directs children as they learn to become more selfmanaged and self-disciplined in their behaviour as they mature.



We seek to guide students to:

- See creation as the handiwork of God, and treat it with respect in the ways we seek to use and preserve it.
- See the hand of God in all history as it unfolds.
- Understand that our knowledge has limitations, and we must seek to live by faith and trust in God.

- Seek to obey God in every thought, action and word, with a view to developing true wisdom so that they love what ought to be loved and reject what is worthless.
- Reclaim education for God and seek to use it for the service of both God and man.
- Develop Christian Scholarship, with a commitment to understanding how culture and society can glorify God in every area.
- Aspire to excellence in Sports; caring for the body and developing its physical abilities.
- Aspire to excellence in the areas of Visual Arts, Music and craftsmanship, so that the works of both the mind and hands reflect the glory of God.

Direct Instruction

What is the Direct Instruction method?

Teachers at Covenant use the more traditional Direct Instruction model (teachercentred). This means students are clearly directed and instructed in knowledge, rather than being expected to direct their own learning (child-centred).

The real power of direct instruction comes from the careful analysis of each skill taught. The skill is broken down into its component parts, then each component skill is taught to mastery. Afterward, the skills are combined into a larger context where different skills are utilized across settings, resulting in generalized fluency.

Factual knowledge must precede skill.

Trying to teach students skills such as analysis or synthesis in the absence of factual knowledge is impossible.

The teacher tells students what they need to know, and shows them how to do a new skill.

The teacher and students practise working through the new skill together.

3 You do

Students do the work for themselves, with monitoring and feedback from the teacher.

The memorisation of core facts at an early age provides the best foundation for further learning.


Students thrive in an environment where they know they have the ability to master their work, and are being set up to succeed.

Covenant uses *Prime Mathematics,* a world-class program based on the effective teaching and learning practices of Singapore, Republic of Korea and Hong Kong - consistent top performers in international studies.

Strong Foundations - Literacy

Covenant uses **The Spalding Method**, a comprehensive Years K-6 total language program called **The Writing Road to Reading**.

This program aims to teach *all* students to spell, write and read. The success of Spalding with diverse students, including those who have learning disabilities or are learning English as a second language, is in large part due to the integration of scientifically-based content and methodology.

The Writing Road to Reading is a favourite of classroom and resource room teachers, adult educators as well as home educators because Spalding-taught students become competent and enthusiastic readers, spellers and writers. It is used with great success in Australia, Canada, Central America, Europe, Singapore, Taiwan and the United States.

How Does Spalding Work?

The English language is made up of 45 sounds (phenomes). Students are taught the 70 letter combinations (phonograms) that makes up these sounds - along with the 26 rules that govern how they are put together by Term 3 of Kindergarten.

This enables students, within their first year of education, to master the foundational building blocks of the English language.

Students are then able to pronounce almost every word they encounter when reading, and are also able to spell and write words they hear.



The Spalding Method integrates six disciplines: listening, speaking, reading, writing, spelling and composition.

Students see, hear, say and write, using all channels to the brain to enhance retention.

Secondary Education

Students trial electives by term or semester in Years 7-8, with options broadened as students move into Years 9-10.

A few additional core units are also added in Years 9&10 to enhance student knowledge:

Study Skills is provided on an elective line for students who would benefit from extra time and small group support in core subjects. They are accountable for bringing work and recording their use of time, with support always available for undertaking assigned work.

Business Studies includes economics, business terms & concepts, principles and entrepreneurship; managing risk; standard of living; globalization and interdependence.

Thinking Skills seeks to develop students' ability to develop logic, construct meaningful argument, and understand fallacies.

Language - Students may study any language they wish via our correspondence study partners. Lessons are done via phone link,

under teacher supervision.

Art Club


Open to all Secondary students, Art Club is held one afternoon a week after school during Terms 2 & 3. Students are introduced to painting techniques, particularly focusing on oils.



Fees & Levies

The tuition fees cover virtually all student costs eg. text books, exercise books, excursions.

Structure & Governance

Q: Is Covenant run by one particular church?

A: No, Covenant is incorporated under the ACT Associations Incorporation Act and is separate from any particular church. The Association's membership includes a fellowship of Christian people who are actively involved in their local Protestant Church and are united in their commitment to education at Covenant.

Q: Who manages the school?

A: The general affairs of the Association are governed and managed by a governance body, known as the Council. The Council is responsible for high-level decision making, strategic planning and policy development and consists of up to nine members, all of whom are members of the Association.

The School Executive manages the day-to-day operations of the school and is accountable to the Council. The School Executive includes the school's Principal and Business Manager.

The professional teaching staff and the School Executive are responsible for the day-to-day education at Covenant.

Enrolment

Please submit an Application for Enrolment form for each child at the Covenant Office.

Application submission fee:

- \$75 per child;
- \$150 for two or more children (non-refundable administration fee).

Subject to an interview and a letter of offer, places are granted to students in Kindergarten to Year 10.

A number of criteria are taken into consideration before an interview takes place and a position is offered. One full term's notice of withdrawal must be given in writing or a term's fees are payable in lieu of notice.
